Syrah or Shiraz? Pour yourself a glass of your favorite syrah or shiraz and relax...they're exactly the same grape varietal. The only difference is that this dark, luscious grape is called shiraz when it's grown in Australia. It's called syrah pretty much everywhere else..

Shiraz tends towards bigger bolder styles with spice and black pepper. Syrah leans towards more floral, elegant wines. Remember however that Shiraz/Syrah is always big bodied.

Number 5 Wine Tip

New Zealand Pinot Noir shows the fine tannins and elegance of good Burgundy with the added excitement of vibrant, intense fruit and secondary herbal, spice and game characters.

Distinct regional styles are beginning to emerge from New Zealand. The Wairarapa wines are full-bodied and dense with rich dark plum and chocolate flavours. Marlborough and Nelson show complex, tight structure with bright cherry flavours. Waipara Pinot Noir shows hints of pepper and spice whilst Central Otago are known for their herbal notes, berryfruit and firm tannins.

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The history of French wine spans a period of at least 2600 years dating to the founding of Massalia in the 6th century BC by Phocaeans with the possibility that viticulture existed much earlier. The Romans did much to spread viticulture across the land they knew as Gaul, encouraging the planting of vines in areas that would become the well known wine regions of Bordeaux, Burgundy, Alsace, Champagne, Languedoc, Loire Valley and the Rhone.

Over the course of its history, the French wine industry would be influenced and driven by the commercial interest of the lucrative English market and Dutch traders. Prior to



the French revolution, the Catholic Church was one of France's largest vineyard owners-wielding considerable influence in regions such as Champagne and Burgundy where the concept of terroir first took root. Aided by these external and internal influences, the French wine industry has been the pole bearer for the world wine industry for most of its history with many of its wines considered the benchmark for their particular style. The late 19th and early 20th century brought considerable change-earmarked by a changing global market and competition from other European wine regions like Italy and Spain as well as emerging New World wine producers like California, Australia and South America.
